AN EDITORIAL

There is a saying in A.A.:

"I'D RATHER AIM FOR THE MOON AND MISS IT THAN AIM FOR THE GUTTER AND HIT IT!"

In this issue you will read many different viewpoints concerning the financial, operational, and future policy for the Orange County AA Central Office.

On page 5, the report from the Citizens Committee tells you that all is well; that money talk should be discontinued for 6 months, preferably a year. On that same page we have printed, for the first time, a list of groups and their contributions for the past year.

Page 4 will show you a letter questioning the drop in Central Office 12th Step calls, and activity. You will also learn on that same page that there were only 19 group representatives at the last Intergroup Meeting.

The proposed budget is in this issue, as promised, for you to study.

We question the report that all is well and that we should cease and desist on the plea for help....in fact, we question any idea of declaring a moratorium on anything!

There is another saying much to the point: "In A.A. you can't stand still. You either progress or regress".

Are we becoming complacent about both the operation and the future growth and requirements of a top "Service Center"?

The needs of the office are far reaching. For one example- if we are to remain in that location, we must have an air conditioner.

Have you been there in the middle of summer when its 100 degrees or more? Hotter than blazes with only a small blower fan- which, incidentally should be returned to its rightful and more than patient owner.

And the refrigerator- donated to us by the widow of Cleve C.- much appreciated- but needs regulating and service. There are many things that need doing---just go and look! Does our office have to stay this way? Why can't the office have a plan for self-improvement? That's the purpose of A.A. for the individual! Why not for the office? To have a conservative, comfortable, but well appointed office- (even possibly fairly decent office furniture) isn't misrepresentation, unless we see it this way. The "sackcloth and ashes" routine was OK when we were brand new with little to go on- but that was over 2 years ago.

Turning the office over to God to take care of alone won't bring results. WE HAVE TO DO THE LEG WORK. The A.A. image is important to the A.A. newcomer and outsider alike- the dignity and future of this Service Center is in the hands of the A.A. member himself. Let's not settle for half measures! "They avail us nothing." The budget is too low.

Let's put the budget up where it belongs. Let's set goals and with the help of the Higher Power attempt to reach them. Let's get busy. Get to the Intergroup Meetings if you care at all- whether you are a representative or not.

Don't let the other fellow decide everything for you. Let's strive to make the Orange Co. Central Office the best in the state. IT IS YOUR OFFICE!

Gentlemen:

The writer has instituted a new program whereby men not so physically ill as to require hospitalization desiring the facilities of the new Honor Farm may avail themselves of this service without the necessity of being first confined in the psychopathic ward of the Orange County Hospital.

Those desiring this Fresh Air and Sunshine Treatment are given a paper instructing them to appear at the psychopathic unit of the Orange County Hospital on a Thursday morning between 8.30 and 11.00 A.M. for a physical examination. They then appear at the Court Session held at the hospital each Friday morning at 8.30 and are sent directly to the Farm. Stays at the Farm will ordinarily be for a minimum of 30 days though this is not a hard and fast rule.

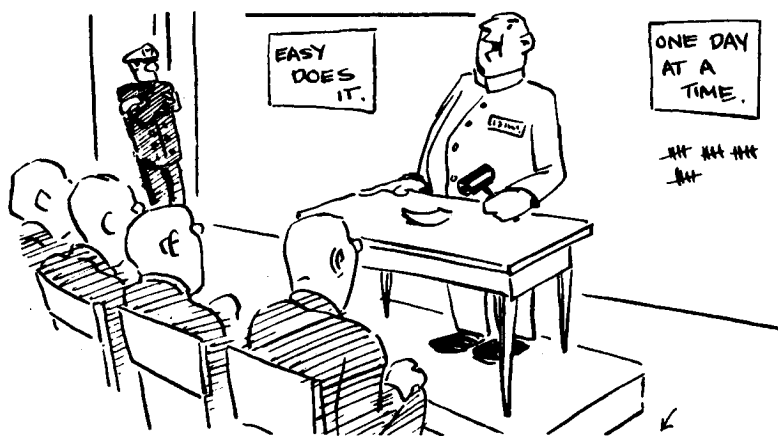
It is felt that this program has many advantages over past procedures. Among other things the past heavy expense and unpleasant confinement with mental patients are avoided. The only requisites are a sincere desire to quit drinking and to be helped in this manner.

Applicants will be processed through the District Attorney's Office.

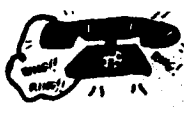
Mondays at 10 A.M. is set aside for sewing- If you can sew and would like to help, you are needed.

Editor, The Lifeline:

At the risk of injuring the feelings of a few people, I feel that it is necessary to point out to as many members as possible the rather abrupt drop-off in Central Office activity in the last 3 months:

Don't get me wrong; I'm not complaining. The last 3 months 12th step calls are at the rate of 500 per year which is a lot of new happy people, but we were up to a rate of 1000-1500 per year.

This is not "Johnny's Office" or "Jim's Office" or "Warren's Office", it's OUR office! Are we supporting it properly? Is there enough volunteer help? I noted at the last (January) Intergroup meeting that only about half dozen 5-8 shifts had been covered in January and asked if we wanted to continue keeping the office open from 5-8. One 12th step call during this period each weekday would add an additional 22 calls per month to raise the total by an additional 50%. What I've been trying to say is that I don't know why there is such a decrease in 12th step calls and overall activity, but if it is anyone's "fault", it's yours, not theirs.

REPORT OF ELLERY S. (WAYS & MEANS) CENTRAL OFFICE 2ND ANNIVERSARY

HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO US-

"Boozing wasn't my problem. - I was my problem and still am." This was the keynote of a sincere, very thoughtful, and fascinating talk given by Dick W. at the A.A. meeting following the dinner to celebrate these second birthday of our central office. 141 alcoholics and friends came to the Disneyland Hotel Sunday, February 2nd to show their faith in the central office and incidentally to have a wonderful time, an excellent dinner and a first class meeting led by Bob C. Jack B. did another expert job for the Ways & Means Committee in organizing the ticket sales and taking charge of the many details required to make the celebration a success. The thinly disguised hand of the Higher Power could be discerned in all quarters: Dick W.'s excellent talk, the cooperation of almost all those present in buying their tickets or making their reservations in advance - resulting in an amazingly accurate estimate of attendance by Jack B. - the help of the Ways & Means Committee and some other friends in selling tickets, and the genuine "goof" of Bob C. which unintentionally netted \$ 62 additional for the central office, for a total of close to \$250. Before the meeting we were treated to a brief account of the Central Office by Johnny H. and a very interesting talk by A.A.'s good friend, Presiding Judge Raymond Thompson, who outlined some of the procedures whereby alcoholics receive help from our local courts and related facilities.

The climax of the entire evening was the lighting of two sturdy candles on that triumph of art over matter, the ultimate in decorated cakes, turned out by Mistress Cheffe, Jeanne T. Johnny and Mary H. and Jim and Pat M. the retired and the present secretary-manager and their "higher powers", of the Central Office, easily raised enough wind to blow out the candles to the tune of "Happy Birthday to Us". It certainly was, thanks to Orange County A.A.

REPORT OF INTERGROUP MEETING:

The regular monthly meeting of Orange Co. A.A. Intergroup was held as usual; However the small attendance may have been caused by the, "Big Fight" - The Liston-Clay fight; - that is.

Only 19 persons were present, which brought up an interesting question of how many constituted a quorum at an intergroup meeting. - Since Intergroup is presently operating without By-laws; the only way to be represented is "Be there".

The resignation of John H. as director of Public Relations came as an unhappy surprise - Johnny is, "leaving the area". We wish him the best of everything and give our thanks for a big job - well done.

Harriet M. touched briefly upon the subject of volunteer help at the central office - "On most nights there's just not enough volunteers to keep the phones covered and do all of the other work that has to be done at the central office -" You are needed!

The Citizens Committee on Finances headed by Bill L. presented their report which is published in its entirety elsewhere in this issue.

REPORT OF THE CITIZENS COMMITTEE
TO THE ORANGE COUNTY INTERGROUP

February 24, 64

To: Orange County Intergroup Board
From: The Citizens Committee
Re: Finances

Before presenting our findings, we feel it proper to summarize briefly what we assumed to be the purpose of the committee.

1. To examine all phases of the financial status of the Central Office.

2. To make recommendations to the board concerning fiscal matters.

We recognize that it would be easy to get in to areas that are essentially the responsibilities of the Board alone, and we apologize in advance if our conclusions suggest that we pre-empted the Board's areas of action. These matters all are inter-related, but we have tried not to prescribe Central Office policy.

For calendar year 1963 the figures show a gross income from all sources of some \$9,600 and expenses of \$9,175. However, if we eliminate costs of special events we show a gross income of \$8,270 and operating expenses of \$7,850. (See below). In the interests of simplicity, we have not considered the Literature Fund in these figures.

As can be seen, there was a small operating surplus for the entire year. Turning to the present status, we have an existing budget as follows: Fixed and variable monthly expenses of approximately \$500, offset by the regular monthly contributions in 1963 of \$570. With no present change in expenses and income, this office would show a surplus of over \$800 in the year ahead. In sum, we urge that an end be made to all mention of money matters for at least 6 months (and preferably a year) and that this become official Intergroup policy. Let us reaffirm our devotion to unity, our faith in service, and the principles of attraction and gratitude.

As the Chairman pointed out on January 28th the miracle is here! Orange County Central Office exists, it is being supported and is serving. With just the monthly support we have already received, the office can meet all present expenses and even provide a small surplus. It is therefore the specific recommendations of this committee that: 1. every AA group in Orange County be directly thanked by letter, to be read by whomever the Board directs, (consistent with group policy) for the support and encouragement which they have shown; 2. That all contributions be individually acknowledged in writing; 3. That we invite suggestions as to how we can better serve AA and help others to recover from alcoholism; and 4. That the Intergroup Board set the example for the least possible service organization and the least possible money. In short that we declare for the principle of corporate poverty as stated in AA Comes of Age.

In closing this report, the committee specifically wants to express genuine gratitude for the help given to us by our secretary Jim M. and to publicly declare the feeling that we are all very lucky to have him working for us.

A.A. ON A BUSINESS TRIP TO EUROPE

I dislike travelogues. They bore me, but your editor asked me to do this and who can refuse her? Besides, there is a point for sobriety in this one.

My function on this trip was to provide technical "know-how" for an industrial combine-to drill for oil and gas in the North Sea, not a simple problem. Many industrialists, businessmen and other engineers were involved, and the man in the "cork hat" was always present, taking his bow in boardrooms, luncheons, staid hotel lounges, night clubs, --- even breakfast hotel room conferences.

This was my first European trip- sober. All of my many associates drank, but not like I used to. I found it advisable to have a glass of gingerale or lime and tonic in my hands: fewer questions that way. And if the party appeared to be getting out of hand, I would slip out the back door to avoid embarrassing my friends.



Being sober on such a trip surely had many advantages. I was the confidant of all - because my tongue didn't wag with a few drinks. A.A. taught me to listen; I did. I dared to rent a car and learned to drive left-handed. Even in miserable January weather in North England exploring country roads, the old Roman Wall, and Scottish castles around Edinburgh, was a pleasure I had not dared enjoy on past trips when I was drinking. And how about the cute barmaid in the hotel at Tyne-mouth who thought I was just wonderful with, "Imagine! -an American who doesn't drink!"



Or, the Dutch musical combo at the Grand Central in The Hague who, also interested in the sober American, played and sang cowboy songs (the Dutch accents were hilarious). Then there was the friend in London who, sipping his fifth double scotch at luncheon, was amused that I would order coffee with my meal. I returned his smile in kind, but for a better reason.

I didn't get to A.A. on the continent, my trips were too quick and busy. Impressions of A.A. in the U.K. were similar to A.A. in the mid-west of the U.S., meetings hard to find, very anonymous, very grim, very earnest, few women members, little public acceptance or support, few laughs and none of the Hollywood touch, but good sound A.A. I was privileged to help ease the anguish of a sick London housewife attending her first A.A. meeting. Wish I could have done more. The British have a national character trait which is great in war but hell for getting sober. They can, and do, close their minds to the disagreeable

the sordid, the suffering of themselves and others. Because of this and a fierce ego/pride A.A. does not come easily to these people.

Cold is the word for U.K. and the Low Countries in January- cold, damp and gray, with 60 degree hotel rooms, hot water bottles in bed (a poor substitute), baths halfway down the hall and cold, windows always open. One night I bathed with a T-shirt and towel over my shoulders! And those damned chamber pots Had an insane desire to empty one into the street in New Castle one night. But from the ridiculous to the sublime, a heated bathroom 24 feet long in Edinburgh made me feel like Mussolini sitting on the throne. How do the gals work these bidets? Let's try: "Oops- not that way!"

Our last dinner was in an intimate London cafe, soft lights, good music, good food. The owner visited at length with us - introduced us to many apparent guests. Then he asked, "What do Americans think of Dr. Stephen Ward?" One of my friends answered, "High class pimp!" The good neighbor policy took a jolt with that. It seems that this character is a martyr to some and a friend of many. I took a second look at the four gals our host had just introduced, now sitting at a back table near the orchestra. I shuddered just a little. "Damn, I'm glad I'm sober."

It's wonderful to be home! I'm awfully proud of California, my adopted State. First, I got sober here and that's a big point to me. In the Central Office in Edinburgh they had an A.A. map of the world and someone had marked a heavy red circle around California - it's A.A. population by far the largest in the world. And those people liked my relaxed, friendly, happy brand of A.A. - California style. They envy California and all our opportunities here. When I spoke at a meeting and said I was happy- even glad I had become an alcoholic and explained why, nobody scoffed or laughed. They believed me.

Nowadays when so many of our non-AA friends are using A.A. as a referral source (blessings on them), it's good to review just what we can do and what, traditionally we cannot do to help the newcomer.

1. AA cannot furnish initial motivation.
2. Cannot diagnose.
3. Cannot give medical advice or medication.
4. Does not give professional spiritual advice.
5. Cannot do professional screening.
6. Does not give tips on detoxicants.
7. Does not engage in psychotherapy.
8. Cannot offer professional referral.
9. Cannot perform social service jobs, i.e., provide housing, clothing, financial aid, family counselling.
10. Cannot provide a guarantee of sobriety.
11. Does not send a bill.

FROM ALATEEN

WHAT IS ALATEEN?

Alateen is the name given to groups of young people who seek help with problems that arise when Alcoholism afflicts a parent or other close relative or friend.

Alateen members meet to exchange experiences and to gain an understanding of the alcoholic. This helps them keep their own lives and personal development from being affected too deeply by close association with an alcoholic.

Alateens learn to accept the fact that alcoholism is a disease. They learn to detach themselves emotionally from their parent's difficulties while continuing to love them. Study of the 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous teaches them to accept the fact that



they are powerless over alcohol and its effects on other people.

Alateen helps to enlighten teen-agers as to their own faults and failings which may or may not come from living with an alcoholic -it inspires them with a desire for personal improvement through more sympathetic understanding of others.

Any young person between 12 and 20, who is troubled by the alcoholic behavior of a relative or friend, is eligible for membership in an Alateen Group.

(Note: This does not necessarily mean the relatives of practising alcoholics. Most of the membership consists of sons and daughters of sober AA members.)

HOW ALATEEN HAS HELPED ME-

My story:

I was born in the Good Samaritan Hospital in Los Angeles. During the first two years I lived in Sunland. For the next three years I lived in Altadena and then for two and a half years in Seattle, Washington. I changed school often- once a year and sometimes twice. I don't know if this constant traveling did me any harm or good.

My trouble started when we moved to Laguna My Dad was drinking and I was in the third grade. The usual Saturdays pattern was mother and father's fighting. At such times I went up to my room, locked the door and turned the radio on. When I was nine, we moved to Chicago. We four children tried to help settle their differences, but the problem was too great for us- so the family left Dad in Chicago to sell the house. While he stayed there, I got in with the wrong kind of group at the beach. We went down to the beach every day, never doing any home work. I was starting to get into trouble and ditched school with a few of my other friends. I didn't care what happened to me because I thought it would hurt my mother, not myself. Then near the end of the school year I was expelled. It didn't matter, I didn't like school any way. When in trouble, I blamed it on somebody else, never on myself. That summer I spent every day at the beach, not even trying to look for a job. The next year I tried to enroll in High School again. My attitude was to do better than I had in the past. Then one time I skipped one class and the disciplinarian and the boy's counsellor found out. At that time I was permanently expelled.

That is when the serious trouble began. I was out of school, and there was nothing to do, except goof around and get into trouble. One day I decided to steal a motor bike from the school and so I took one. That day I rode it around until the bike got a flat tire. During the following three days I "borrowed" 3 more of them and wrecked them all. On the last day when I stole the last one, the cops

caught me and drove me to the station, took my picture and finger prints, asked me some questions, and then put me in jail until five that night. Then they sent me to Juvenile Hall in Orange. That one day in jail, I asked myself, "What am I doing here?" The next twenty days in the Hall helped me very much.

Now I am back in school and enjoying life to the fullest because I understand a little about it. When first introduced to A.A., I didn't understand it, but then later on began to grasp it. The Twelve Steps helped me with my problems and to live a happier and fuller life. The first one showed me how to get along with my Dad. We live together, my Dad and I. We do almost everything together today. I used the second step in the Hall and turned my will and life over to God. Also, in the Hall, on the day of court I gave up, and asked God to return me to where I belonged. I am always taking the inventory step. It disciplines me when I am on my own. Admitted to God, to the cops and myself when I was doing things wrong means I was entirely ready for these defects to leave. It takes much more courage to break away from the wrong way than it does from the good way. Applying step 8 with the Chief of Police, I went to the police department, made amends. He was proud of me, and he also said it was like getting an extra pay check. When I am home and alone, I always in the morning say the Serenity Prayer to myself.- the most important step to me is the one about spiritual awakening. I had that awakening in the Laguna Beach jail. If I wasn't going to Alateen, my life wouldn't have been anything to be proud about. I wouldn't have gone to the Chief to make amends if I hadn't started going to Alateen. I owe my life to Alateen and the people behind it. I wish that more young people knew about Alateen, and how much it helps those who want help.
