How about a **GROUP INVENTORY?**

Step Four and Step Ten have to do with personal inventory. All twelve of AA's suggested Steps are personal in that they deal with the individual. They constitute his charter of freedom.* The Twelve Traditions, on the other hand, relate to AA as a whole and to AA in its various parts, particularly the groups. They constitute AA's guide to unity.* Now if the individual should take periodic inventory, why not the group? (And, incidentally, why not the local club, Intergroup, and General Service Headquarters?)

A GROUP is not an inanimate thing. You hear references made to the "spirit of this group..." "A group has personality and so do individuals. Some groups do well, others do poorly. Some groups flourish for a while and then go into a decline. Some groups fail, close down and cease to hold meetings. Why?

If an individual should take inventory even if he is doing well, why not the group? If things are not progressing satisfactorily, then an inventory is particularly in order.

How does a group take inventory? Much in the same manner as an individual. It should probably be done at a closed meeting. The leader might have pencil and paper and some prepared questions. The group then, through its members present, should review its assets and liabilities— not just financial items, tho these, too, might be included. Emphasis should be given to the over-all job being done, to an examination of how the group is executing its responsibility. This might be best accomplished by asking some questions. The following queries are not intended to be complete in coverage but merely illustrative. They may suggest others more directly applicable to your group.

1) What is the basic purpose of the group? To keep its members sober? To welcome new members? To provide a

social outlet? The Fifth Tradition says, "Each group has but one primary purpose... to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers." Is that somewhat surprising?

2) Just what does your group doing to "carry" the message? Does it take refuge completely in the Eleventh Tradition which says, "Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion"? Sure, it welcomes newcomers, but is that carrying the message, or is it reaping the harvest resulting from the prior sowing of others? Does the newcomer in fact practically have to beat down your door in order to get in? If he sneaks in, do you ignore him?

3) Your group has 35 members after 5 years of existence. "Very good," you think. Are you sure the number should not be 100? What is your "trading area" population? 60,000? Applying the national average, there should be 1,500 drunks in your area. Again applying the rough national average, 55 of the 1,500 should be in AA. But with your group's talent, members with available time, and other assets, perhaps your figure should be half again as large as the national average. Perhaps then you should have 82 instead of the projected 55 or the 35 you actually have? Why don't you have more? Has your group done anything lately to bring the AA message to the attention of

local editors, physicians, judges, teachers, and other public leaders who can be helpful in reaching those who need AA?

4) Are you getting a proper cross-section of your community? Or just the low bottoms? Or just the high bottoms who form a cozy, exclusive clique to which other types of alcoholics receive a frigid welcome? Do you get the proper percentage of men and women? Or mostly men? Or mostly women?

5) Do your members stick or is turnover excessive? Do a lot of new prospects come in but fall by the wayside quickly? Are you complacently sure that part of this is not due to group methods? Does your group do a proper job in educating, encouraging, and assisting the spouse of the alcoholic?

6) How effective is your sponsorship system and how much of a sense of sponsorship responsibility does your group have? What does it do about a prospect who comes in without a sponsor? Or the one who comes for awhile and then does not show up? How many times will you "go after" him? Twice, ten times? Or do you say, "to H—l with him," or "he knows where it is. If he wants it, let him come and get it"?

7) Has everything practical been done to provide an attractive meeting place where new people will be reasonably

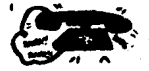

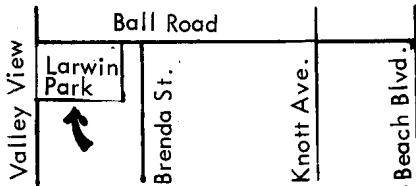

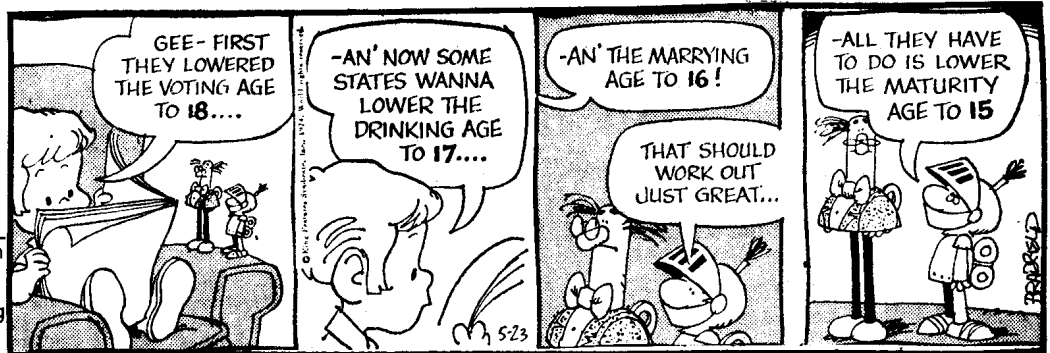

A SENTENCE TO LIVING.....

AA has led me to the kind of life that I searched endlessly for and couldn't find. Finally, I quit trying and began to try to die. When I finally made it to AA on July 3rd 1972 it was due to a severe case of impending doom and after all July 4th was the day the slaves were freed. Couldn't I find freedom from alcoholism?

I had been to a few AA meetings whenever I was due for court, but could not accept it as my problem. Many times in the first three months I didn't want to stay, and I would feel out of place and withdrawn by my introverted behavior.

During my third week in AA, I went to court for my third 502. The judge sentenced me to twelve weeks of AA, and I realize now it was also a sentence to living. The woman that signed my card always smiled and gradually I felt like I belonged. That judge, with my Higher Power's help, put me where I could no longer deny my alcohol problem.

So now, I no longer just exist, I live with all the ups and downs of life. I love this program and the people who helped me find sobriety. With my Higher Power's help as I lose my self-importance, maybe I can help some new people as a Harbor District judge helped me.....Carl

THESE SHOES WERE MADE FOR WALKING.....

If you have chosen AA as your program for living, walk in your new shoes proudly. You must surrender your old pair, not to do so will walk you back to that dark path. For your new shoes to be comfortable you must wear them often. You must take pride in your AA pair, so they last a long time. If at first they seem tight in places, remember if you couldn't feel them they might fall off. If they cause blisters and then heal, its you that has something to share.

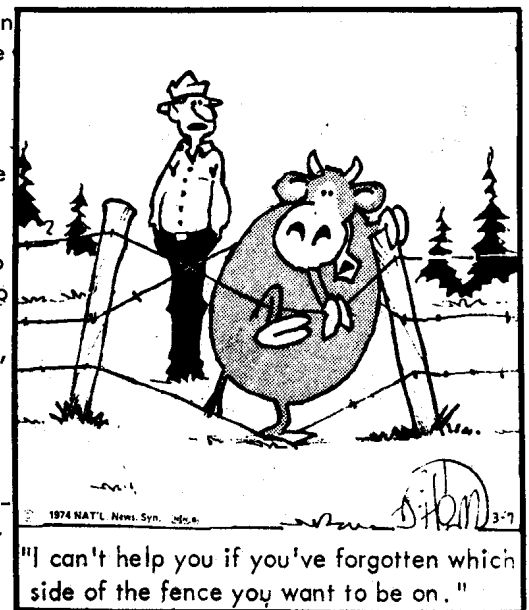
If you scuff your new shoes, polish them with Honesty to preserve them. If they gather dust, expose them more often to the Steps. If someone steps on the toe of your new shoes, it could be you who was underfoot. Open your mind as you break them in, take it easy, be kind to yourself and rest your feet when they are tired.

There will be times you might wish you had chosen a pair that didn't have to be secured, some that you could slip into without any effort. You might wish they were more colorful, but why change now, they're beginning to grow on you. They wouldn't fit you if you let someone else break them in. Take each step in earnestness so they will wear even and last longer. Walk like you talk and the tightness will ease sooner. Maybe your wardrobe doesn't all match, just be patient, it will all look good together someday.

The more you wear your new shoes the sooner they will form to the shape of your feet. Share your steps with others. After you have walked down the road of sobriety they will almost feel like a second skin, always there to protect your every step and so comfortable you wouldn't want to walk without them.

The following are excerpts from the talk given by our Delegate— not covered in the report last month, but could be of great interest to you.

LITERATURE . . .

"I would like to go a bit more into detail concerning the Conference Literature Committee, of which I am a member. The new booklet, "Staying Sober-- Some Methods A.A. Members Have Used for Not Drinking" will, in my opinion, fill a very real need in working with newcomers. For example, some of the sub-headings in the section called, "Quick Answers to Some First Questions," are "How do you explain to the family? business associates? friends?" . . . "What do you say and do when offered a drink?" "Should I keep liquor or beer in my house? go to bars? . . . "What about insomnia? drinking dreams? fears?" . . . "What about sex?" And there are 30 other sections covering such subjects as "Staying away from the first drink," . . . "Using the 24 hour plan," . . . "Availing Yourself of a Sponsor," . . . "Avoiding ALL chemical mood-changers," and many, many more, all written in the simplest language.

As you may recall, our Delegate last year proposed to the Finance Committee, and the Conference approved, using the slogan "A Penny a Day for Sobriety. Is Your Sobriety Worth a Penny?" The result is that the folder "How Far Can \$3 Go?" is being redesigned and rewritten to better utilize that slogan and it will include a section on how groups distribute their contributions after group expenses are paid; i. e., 60-30-10, divided between central office, GSO and the Area Committee.

The pamphlet "Questions & Answers on Sponsorship" is to be rewritten to include suggestions on making a 12th step call and a new title reflecting the change will be something like "12th Step Calls and Sponsorship."

The Conference Literature Committee also recommended that the Trustees Literature Committee explore the need for a pamphlet on taking the 4th and 5th steps and that the last talks of our two founders be prepared in pamphlet form in memory of Bill and Dr. Bob.

Some of you have expressed the thought that we have all the literature and pamphlets we need. . . that most alcoholics don't read them anyway. . . that all of the information is in our Big Book, the 12 & 12 and the Concepts. And perhaps

you are right. But I've heard it said and I agree, that we will never change one word in the 12 Steps, the 12 Traditions, the 12 Concepts and the Conference Charter "except by first asking the consent of the registered A.A. groups of the world." Therefore, since we all must live in a constantly changing society, facing problems of different and various types, it is only through revising and adding to our pamphlets and booklets that we incorporate the experiences of the new, often younger alcoholic, whose need to share with us is as great as ours. Please think about that, won't you?

INSTITUTIONAL COMMITTEES

The reports of the Trustees' and Conference Institutional Committees gave me new insight into the importance of this arm of service. The two pamphlets AA in Prisons and AA in Hospitals are being updated on the basis of results of a survey made in 1973. One important fact that developed is that 90% of prison officials have a high regard for those inmates attending A.A. meetings. However, only about 10% of the inmates sentenced for crimes in which alcohol was a factor are voluntarily attending AA meetings. . . and this is a challenge to our institutional committees. It was recommended that these Committees and outside sponsors inform inside AA group officers what the outside AA members can and cannot do. Two topics under consideration for the Institutions sessions at the 1975 International are 1) Working with detox centers and rehabs; and 2) Making AA more attractive to inmates.

1975 INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

As some of you may recall, following the 1970 International Convention in Miami, this Area made some strong recommendations for consideration prior to the 1975 Convention. This year's Conference reconfirmed the following actions with regard to the International Convention to be held in Denver, Colorado, July 4-5-6, 1975: 1) That the number of non-AA speakers be limited, and that they be people who are interested in AA and alcoholism. 2) That there be at least one AA meeting held at the same time non-AAs are speaking so that members will always have a choice. 3) That the speakers at the Sunday morning spiritual meeting be A.A. members.

The theme of the International will be "LET IT BEGIN WITH ME." The official opening of the Convention is on Friday but there will be dances on Thursday evening, July 3. The headquarters hotel will probably be the Executive Towers, which is still under construction. Definite information with registration and housing forms will be available about January 1. Most of the meetings will be in Currihan Hall with alkathons in various hotels. GSO has already received reports on charter flights planned from England, Belgium, Ireland, Switzerland and Germany as well as from the U.S. and Canada.

AREA'S CONTRIBUTION TO G.S.O.

"Since returning from the Conference I have received word that the Area's contribution toward Conference expenses for next year will be raised from \$150 to \$200 in accordance with an advisory action of the Finance Committee. It has become increasingly apparent that A.A. is not self-supporting through contributions! For example, in California there are 1,892 groups reported as of 1973 year end, with a total of 43,550 members. Only 1,036 of those groups made any contribution to G.S.O. and only 399 groups followed the "Regular Contribution Plan" which means monthly or quarterly. Although California is largest in number of groups and size of membership, it is 51st in per capita contribution. . . \$1.70. Only three states are credited with lower per capita contributions. . . Idaho \$1.67; Illinois \$1.20; Puerto Rico \$1.56. We are all very conscious of our Traditions in this Area but I wonder sometimes if our group officers are made fully aware by GSRs that the 7th Tradition does not involve group autonomy. . . it applies to A.A. as a whole, including our General Service Office and all other service entities!"

Many other highlights of Gene's experiences, her trip to Bill's home, "Stepping Stones", her problems with taxi cabs, etc made her talk most delightful and informative. We are most grateful to her for sharing with us.

WHO IS THE A.A. MEMBER TODAY?

A recent research project revealed that in spite of the tons of material that has been carried in news media, industry publications, television and films, and millions of words that have been written and spoken by our Public Information workers, there is still some misunderstanding among the general public about AA members.

In fact, people who do not personally know any A.A.'s think of AA members as selfish, weak, immoderate and undependable... the characteristic often associated with alcoholics in their active stages. On the other hand, people who do know A.A. members personally, have quite the opposite opinion. It is up to you and me to help dispel the misconceptions. We can certainly improve the image of the A.A. member if we, as happy, healthy, recovering alcoholics, disclose our identity on a personal level to our friends and to those in the "helping" professions with whom we come in contact. This is **ATTRACTION** in the very best sense of the word.

The negative attitude, if held by a large enough segment of the general public, could tend to keep those who need help away from A.A.; and so we should all lend our support to the Public Information workers in carrying the message in our communities. Here are some suggestions from the General Service Board in New York:

The Trustees Public Information Committee has been discussing ways and means of presenting the positive side of life in A.A. to the general public-i.e.,

how hundreds of thousands of recovered alcoholics find happy, fulfilling, and successful lives within and through our Fellowship.

Our Anonymity Tradition, of course, prevents the kind of direct 'public relations activity that a company or institution with a similar problem would undertake.

We are seeking more ways to promote a better understanding of the 'A.A. member today' within the framework of our Traditions. We would welcome any suggestions you may have or experience you may wish to share.*

"Among these are means of encouraging speakers at public meetings or participants in TV and radio programs to emphasize the recovery rather than the disease phases of their personal stories- how they have led richer, fuller lives through AA.

"Others are ways to present a better understanding of the Anonymity Tradition within the Fellowship itself.

"The new General Service Conference booklet, 'Understanding Anonymity', says that 'many members mistakenly think the Tradition applies to personal relationships and this misunderstanding has sometimes caused them to refrain from carrying the message in instances where lives could have been saved.'

"The same booklet lists the following among its suggested guidelines for members related to anonymity: Disclose your own identity, if you wish, at A.A. meetings, in communications with fellow A.A. members, on Twelfth Step calls and with others you might think have a problem, as well as with relatives, friends, concerned

clergymen, doctors, employers, and alcoholism and other agencies where it might be helpful.'

"A 1971 survey showed that 51% of those who come into A.A. are attracted by other A.A. members. This survey also indicated a significant growth in the influence of family members, doctors, counselling agencies and other professionals.

"To sum up, this public information committee feels that if our private and public contacts with press, radio and TV resulted in a more positive presentation of A.A. to the general public, the image of the A.A. members as 'weak immoderate, and undependable' might be substantially corrected.

"We also feel that the same job could be accomplished in large measure by the 'quiet disclosures' of individual members as outlined in the conference-approved pamphlet, 'Understanding Anonymity,' bearing on this question directly."

"Specifically, we are seeking more ways to place the emphasis in our contacts with the press and public on the benefits of the A.A. way of life in addition to the recovery from alcoholism that A.A. makes possible.

If you have views on this subject of "Who is the A.A. member today?," if you have discussed it, or if you have had experience in working with the press in this area, please share with the Trustees 'Public Information Committee of the General Service Board...and with me..

comfortable and to which older members will be glad to return? Or are you satisfied with inadequate quarters on the run-downside? Are you paying reasonable rent or are you taking advantage of some church, fraternal club or other organization which in a sense is underwriting your sobriety? Did you ever figure out how much cash your group could get up in an evening in the days when all who are now its members were drinking and when the cash was going for liquor?

8) Has proper effort been made to explain to all members the need and value of working in the kitchen and performing other housekeeping duties? Have they been told precisely how to do those jobs, or is the whole matter left to their initiative and imagination even though they have little of either? What methods do you use to bring members more definitely into the group, to make them feel that they belong?

9) Is adequate opportunity given to all eligible members to speak before the home group and before other groups? Does anyone actually keep a check list to see that no one is overlooked? How far back does that list go?

10) Do you pick officers with care and consideration on the basis that officership is a great responsibility and an opportunity for unusual Twelfth Step work? Or do you consider the whole thing a chore and a sort of joke, electing someone in open meeting who may not even be present? Do you elect someone because you think it might be good for him, forgetting that our common welfare should come first?

Have you ever given thought to the

selection of a nominating committee whose job it would be to consider all eligible members, evaluate their stability, interest in the group, ability, available time, and other relevant factors? The nominating committee could then present the slate of candidates to the group for its consideration. While other names could be suggested at the election meeting, the group will usually support its committee. This method tends to eliminate the occasional nomination from the floor of the least likely member by an ill-advised or even confused buddy.

11) Does your group lend its fair share of support to Intergroup, the Grapevine, and General Service Headquarters? These service organizations are doing a Twelfth Step job on an area, a national and an international basis. No one group could carry out that responsibility. Could your group prepare and finance the publication of a Big Book? Or contact editors and movie producers to prevent the dissemination of erroneous information that might be harmful to AA, and to supply correct information of value to the alcoholic who still suffers?

AA is easier to know about today because of the work of our service organizations. AA is respected today and it is therefore easier for some of us to join than it was years ago. My sobriety or your sobriety in the final analysis might depend on the over-all national acceptance of AA. Any disgrace to AA on the national level would have an effect in every local area, in every group. Do you ever give any thought to these broader concepts, or is your group thinking solely on a provincial, selfish level? If your group has a broader outlook, does it result in action, in generous help to your

Intergroup, the Grapevine, and General Service Headquarters?

12) Just what has your group done during the last six months to carry the message?

Most of these questions relate to the Fifth Tradition, carrying the message. Many others could be raised relative to a group's success in the light of other Traditions: common welfare, unity, group conscience, money, outside interests, anonymity- could all be subjected to extensive inquiry.

In taking group inventory, the chairman, leader, or secretary might want to make some notes. The group might wish to take action as it went along. Ideas could be referred to committees and chores assigned to specific individuals for execution. A complete set of minutes might be prepared for reading at the next inventory meeting, say six months hence. The minutes might help to look back and see what improvements resulted from the inventory taking.

We are fortunate that it was the group which developed into the primary instrument for channeling the AA message. AA did not necessarily have to develop in that manner. The founders might have chosen paid consultations, paid sanitarium incarceration, paid correspondence courses, or a dozen other methods of transmitting the message.

The fact that the informal, no-dues-or-fees group was created is the principle reason why AA has grown so rapidly.

It may be the reason why you and I are sober.

The group is a precious thing. Let's look after it.
