REPORT FROM NEW YORK

MID-SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA AREA
General Service Conference Report from your Delegate...

If I can make the General Service Conference "come alive" for you as I experienced it in New York April 21-27, then those seven days of hard work and almost continuous meetings will have accomplished the ultimate in my life in A. A. up to this moment.

It was an incomparable experience to have the privilege of meeting and exchanging ideas with delegates from all 50 of the United States and the Provinces of Canada - the Trustees of the General Service Board - the General Service Office and Grapevine staffs - and the directors of A.A. World Services, Inc.... each of whom is dedicated to the preservation of our Fellowship as we are in the Mid-Southern California Area.

The Hotel Roosevelt must be one of the oldest in New York, but there is still evidence of past grandeur as one enters the lobby up a wide, red-carpeted, gold-bannistered set of steps. Off the lobby is the Oval Room where a reception was held on Sunday afternoon for all members of the Conference. This was my first opportunity to meet and talk with other delegates, Trustees and the GSO staff. There is no way to describe my feelings except to tell you I realized what a great responsibility it was to be a part of such an august group and I prayed that I could measure up. It was truly a spiritual experience!

Prior to the opening session on Monday morning we received our Conference portfolios and a check for hotel and meal expenses. All sessions were held in the

Terrace Room adjoining the Oval Room. The speakers platform and lectern are in the far-end of the room with two rows of ten tables creating a center aisle and microphones in both the center and side aisles.

The Conference opened with a welcome by Dr. John Norris, Chairman of the General Service Board, and his report on the Activities of the past year. The keynote address by Trustee Matt N. on the Conference Theme: "Understanding and Cooperation... Inside and Outside A.A." was followed with a taped talk by Bull Wilson, during which there was otherwise absolute silence... as tho' everyone in the room acutely felt Bill's presence.

Dr. Jack introduced the members of the General Service Board and Trustee Committee chairmen; Delegate Chairman Don P. of Denver introduced the chairmen of Conference Committees; and GSO General Manager Robert H. introduced GSO and Grapevine staffs and all department heads. The significance of mentioning this is in the fact that these introductions involved more than 50 individuals (in addition to many stenographic, clerical and other office personnel) whose time and effort is essential in the planning and advance preparation to bring together in one place the delegates chosen by you and me to represent the "grass roots" of our Fellowship... the "trusted servants" who carry the voice of our collective group conscience back to this fo-

cal point to join that of A.A. as a whole; and then bring back to us the life-giving wisdom which results from the exchange of ideas and interaction from the whole of A.A. This is the UNITY on which our personal recovery depends!

Of the 91 delegates attending, 13 were women. I understand it is expected there will be even more women delegates when Panel 25 elections are held.

I am happy to tell you that the delegates from California have gained the reputation in past years of coming to the Conference well-prepared and generally well informed; and this year was no exception. It pleased me very much that a number of people commented that I "had done my home work"... not especially from the personal standpoint, but on behalf of all of you because I could not have been "prepared" if so many of you had not responded to the questionnaire and shared your thoughts with me.

And now to a brief summary of Conference action...

1. It was voted by a 2/3 majority to change the electoral procedure for Class B Regional Trustees, so that in addition to the votes of the delegates from the region involved, an equal number of voters would be drawn from the hat... one-half to come from the Conference Committee on Trustees and one-half from the Trustees' Nominating Committee. There were nine qualified candidates from the Pacific Region, including our own Clyde D.

ROUND UP!

Five ballots were taken without reaching a 2/3 majority, and so the decision went to the hat and Stan W. of Fairfax, California was elected. Stan is well qualified and since there has not been a Regional Trustee elected from California for some years I'm sure we are all pleased.

Approval was also given to a 5 year moratorium on discussion of the electoral procedures for Class B. Regional Trustees at the Conference level as well as to changing Article 10 of the Conference Charter to conform with the new procedure. Article 10 appears on pages 24 & 25 of the latest edition of the A.A. Service Manual.

2. Since the 1973 Conference a World Directory Study Committee has been at work on how to eliminate some of the problems of the past in publishing the Directory and how it could be improved. After carefully studying the ideas and suggestions received over the past five years from many A.A. members, the following recommendations were presented and unanimously approved.

a) Three directories to be prepared and published annually on a rotating basis for the groups in the United States and Canada. For example, one directory each quarter with Part II, the Directory for groups outside the U.S. and Canada, being published in the remaining quarter.

b) The three directories would be subdivided by region and states and/or provinces, listed alphabetically within the region. Group membership figures and group contributions will be listed as in the past and the totals will be given for each state. The directories will be divided into the following geographic sections:

1) Eastern United States - Listing groups in the Northeast, Southeast and East Central Regions.

2) Western United States - Listing groups in the West Central, Southwest and Pacific Regions.

3) Canadian - Listing groups in all of Canada.

Now, turning to the decisions made in connection with the Agenda topics included in our Area questionnaire. Every Agenda topic was discussed in a series of workshops held in nine separate rooms at the hotel. Each delegate was assigned to a specific section, so there were 10 delegates, a trustee, and a member of the GSO staff in attendance

at each workshop. Two delegates of Panel 23 were selected to moderate and to report back. Neither the trustee nor the staff member participated except to answer questions or clarify a point when asked to do so. The reporters for each section met immediately following the workshop and one was elected to give the consensus report to the entire Conference.

The first series of workshops was on the subject of "A.A.'s Relations with Professionals in the Alcoholism Field." The name of the committees handling Professional Relations has been changed to "Trustees' Committee. . . and "Conference Committee. . ." on "Cooperation with the Professional Community." The GSO Secretary is Mary Ellen U.

The work of these committees is of the utmost importance to the primary purpose of our Fellowship. . . carrying the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. If A.A. is to accept its full responsibility, based on the fact that our program of recovery has been the most successful through the years in the rehabilitation of the alcoholic, then we must maintain and continue to develop the channels of communication with all other agencies in the field. If we do not, there is bound to be misunderstanding and distortion because of the utter simplicity of our program. In other words, the "Professional Community", locally and nationally, must be made aware of what A.A. does and does not do. To this end, the pamphlet "Cooperation but Not Affiliation" is now in the process of complete revision and will be ready for distribution soon. Some of you may ask, isn't this an overlap with the purpose of the Public Information Committees? The answer is NO. However both committees collaborate. From the GSO staff I have the following explanation of the difference between P.I. and C.P.C.

P.I. - The purpose of P.I. is to carry the A.A. message to the general public through the media (newspaper, magazine, etc.). Also to the alcoholic through those who are in a position to help him, i.e., wife, husband, doctor, etc.

C.P.C. - (Cooperation with the Professional Community) - Informs those working in the alcoholism field the kind of help that A.A. provides, finding better ways of cooperation and understanding between A.A.s and the professionals in the field of alcoholism.

Other facets of the C.P.C. Committee's deliberations concerned what we have come to know as "Two Hatters;"

signing meeting attendance slips for alcoholics who have been referred to A.A. and the need for C.P.C. committees at the Area level. The voice of conscience of this Area, as previously reported, corresponded right down the line with that of the Conference. It was recommended that a better understanding of the role of "two hatters" be sought through discussion at General Assemblies. I would recommend that the District Committee Chairmen of our Area use the subject of the role of "Two Hatters" as a discussion topic in their workshops. Also, that our Subcommittee on Area Structure give us their recommendations on the need for a Committee on Cooperation with the Professional Community at our Area level.

The second item in our questionnaire concerned our Area Service Committee's relations with central offices and/or intergroups. Your responses indicated by a very wide margin that there is excellent cooperation and very little overlap or conflict in the Mid-Southern California Area. The consensus of the Conference was that there is a general trend toward more and better cooperation and coordination of effort between intergroups and General Service Committees throughout the Fellowship. I'm sure you know that your Delegate's enthusiastic commentary on the splendid relationship we enjoy with these other entities in this Area were well received by the Conference!

The most controversial discussion centered around "Special Purpose Groups." It was your "conscience" that IF they are established groups and not just meetings, and IF they are open to all alcoholics, they are not in violation of Traditions and, therefore, should be listed in the World Directory.

At the first session for discussion on this subject there were three presentations and it became apparent that what we were really talking about was "gay" groups being listed by names that would identify their "special" nature. The session ended with no clear-cut decision having been made and the subject was referred to the "Delegate's Only" meeting for recommendations. It was the consensus at that meeting 1) that the designation "gay" group was not clearly understood by some and the real issue was that we were afraid of the connotation and its effect on the Fellowship. 2) That the wording "Special Purpose" . . . was confusing because the only purpose of an

A.A. group is to help the sick alcoholic regardless of what other problems he or she might have. 3) That to deny Directory listing to any established group because its name indicated its members were largely from a specific strata of society would be wrong. .so long as the group's meetings were not closed to any alcoholic who wished to attend. And 4) that if Directory listing were denied to "gay" groups then it would also have to be denied to other "special purpose" groups such as womens', men's stag and young people's groups, etc.

The final vote taken in special Conference session was to list all A.A. groups in accordance with the definition in the World Directory, which reads: "Traditionally, two or more alcoholics meeting together for purposes of sobriety may consider themselves an A.A. group, provided that, as a Group they are self-supporting and have no outside affiliation Groups listed in the directory are listed at their own request. A directory listing does not constitute or imply approval or endorsement of any Group's approach to, or practice of the traditional A.A. program."

The last two items on our questionnaire concerned programming and promoting special events and the need for supplementary guidelines for the A.A. Service Manual (later the topic was called "Are

We Businesslike About A.A. (Inness?") Our Area conscience. SAT.SPEAKER ded pretty much to that of the conference as you will see when you receive your copy of the "Final Conference Report" from GSO.

You will also find that one more topic was added to the Agenda: "Carrying the 'Service Message' to those who carry the A.A. Message." Included in this presentation, the Delegate from Washington, D.C. told about the success of holding an "Area Mini-Conference." This was patterned pretty much on our Symposium of Service, about which I told the Conference.

As a member of the Conference Literature Committee, I have brought back with me the initial draft of the new booklet, "Staying Sober," on which I am to do a critique. I am very excited about this manuscript, the sub-title of which is "Some Methods A.A. Members have used for Not Drinking." It lays it all out for newcomers in very simple language and answers most of the questions that I, as a newcomer, was too dingy to ask!

It was also recommended that two sections of the Big Book be updated, namely: "Those Who Stopped in Time" and "Nearly lost Everything". Approval was given to delete seven stories from those sections, replacing them with eight stories previously published in the Grapevine which would better meet the needs of today's alcoholics. Additional stories are needed on the American Indian, a Chicano

have a yen to submit your story, writing style is not important. .just tell it in your own words and send it to GSO and the editorial staff will take it from there.

There is much, much more to tell you when I make my "person-to-person" report at various meetings throughout the Area. .for instance, plans for the International Convention in Denver in 1975; plans for the Third World Service Meeting in London next October; the impetus and support being developed for Institutional Committees; the survey planned for later this year; a new pamphlet on taking the 4th and 5th steps; action with regard to the Pacific Region Assembly to be held in Salt Lake City next March; and my visit to "Stepping Stones," the home of Bill and Lois in upstate New York. .ad infinitum!

I give you this report with love and gratitude for having made this glorious experience possible in my life.

However, that I felt you would be interested to know that publication of the questionnaire in the LIFELINE had evoked a response from a point as distant as Albany, New York. And that is why I am sending it to you. . Love and best wishes, Gene.

The Letter received.

Hi Genevieve:

The enclosed card will introduce me as far as name and my present A.A. assign-

ment. (Hudson-Mohawk-Berkshire Area Treasurer). Due to a mutual relationship with a member from your area I have been receiving Lifeline and enjoy it. This is how I have access to the enclosed (Questionnaire). Although my delegate has some ideas from me, he does not have the remarks which I'm sending on to you. I will not burden him with a copy as he is in his first year as delegate and is doing a lot of reading in preparation for his part on the Conference agenda. I would like you to introduce yourself to him at New York and inform him of the remarks which I have sent to you. I do not think that I'm overstepping anyone here as I'm sending you my thoughts as suggested in Lifeline. What it boils down to is that we are all here for the same purpose- to stay sober one day at a time and to help the still suffering alcoholic- therefore the better communications, the better channel of help for those who need it.

Please realize that these ideas are mine and not from any member of my group or area. We are all entitled to our own thoughts. I believe as long as they are constructive in purpose that is what is important.

Many years ago I was introduced to the fellowship but did not arrive back here until 1965. Life has been very good since that time. Not always perfect, but much better in all departments. As for myself I spent quite a bit of time on the skid row area of Albany and it was one hell of a mess.

My job as area treasurer keeps me very active and I love it. We have the only area where once elected to this office you advance right on up to delegate. I realize you are very busy, but if time allows drop a line. Also don't forget to see my delegate. His name is at bottom left. Yours in sobriety,

Nobody can recover for us, but we still can't do it alone. This is why I am so grateful for Alcoholics Anonymous today. You see, when I first came to A.A. I tried awfully hard to work this program by myself. (At first I didn't even want to work it; I just wanted to be smart). I saw how happy these people were, but I also heard them say, we need each other. But not me, I said I don't need these people. I'll just take what they got and change my own life. You see though, it don't work that way. I tried desperately for 3 1/2 months to work this program on my own, wouldn't talk to anyone, wouldn't discuss anything with anyone. But my life got more messed up than it had been. I finally got so bad and I was so confused and going around in circles that I finally got "humble" and "honest" with myself and I went up to a person (who is very dear to me today) on a Wednesday night with tears in my eyes and I said, "Would you help me? I need help." That's the first intelligent thing I've said in 36 years of my life. This person was always so happy and cheerful and understanding; that I figured this person must know something.

What I'm really leading up to is how grateful and Thankful I am to you people in Alcoholics Anonymous who carried the message to me. You see, I found you people and then I found Alcoholics Anonymous and then I found this program that is my new way of life today. I found what I have today while I was still incarcerated in the penitentiary. I'm thankful today for the amount of A.A. I had while I was still incarcerated for it gave me a chance to see myself and to work this program while I was still locked up.

There are people walking the streets who want A.A., but don't know what it is or where to find it. This program is for those who want it. There are those people too who are confined in a hospital or institution and who are looking for a new way of life. I heard them say while I was in and when I first got out as to how rewarding it was and how good it made them feel when they see a man or woman get out of a hospital or institution and choose the A.A. way of life and don't find it necessary to take a drink or to have to go back to a hospital or jail. I got active with institutional work when I got out and I'm still active. I also found it very rewarding to see these guys and gals come out and make it out here. The people who carry the message play an awfully important part in people's lives.

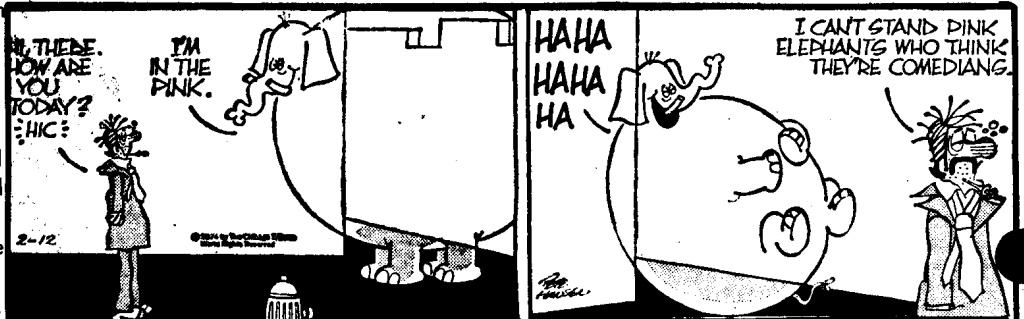
Come join us for a session or two, try it, you may thoroughly enjoy giving away what you have found.

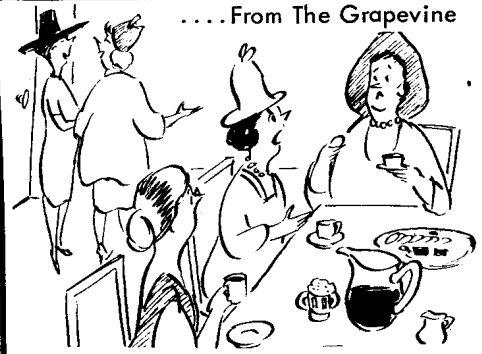

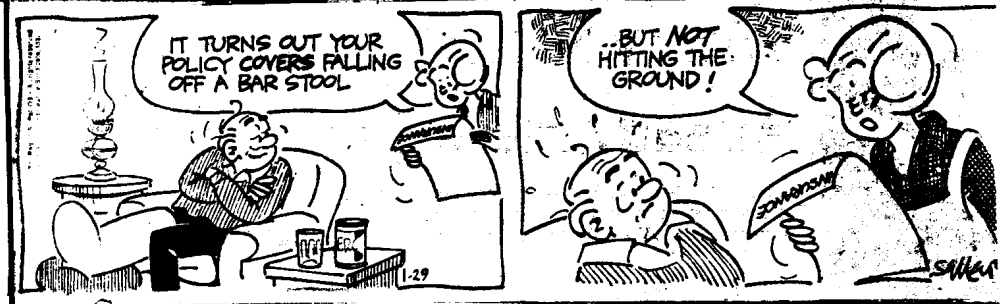
