Mayo Clinic MDs Develop Test To Uncover 'Hidden Alcoholics'

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) - Can you stop drinking without a struggle after one or two drinks?

Have you ever neglected your obligations, your family or your work for two or more days in a row because you were drinking?

Have there been times in your adult life when you have found it necessary to completely avoid alcohol?

These questions are part of a test developed by Mayo Clinic researchers to identify the "hidden alcoholic" in the general medical population. It's a self-administered test that's aimed at helping doctors spot alcoholism early in patients who have seemingly unrelated physical problems.

Developers of the 34-question test are Dr. Robert M. Morse, a Mayo Clinic psychiatrist and director of the Alcoholism Treatment Unit at Rochester Methodist Hospital and Dr. Wendell M. Swenson, head of the psychology section at the clinic.

The questions are straightforward to the point of appearing simple. But the researchers, by scientific study, have found that a score of 10 is a good indicator of alcoholic tendencies.

The National Institute of Alcoholism and Alcohol Abuse estimates that approximately 100 million Americans drink, and of that number, 8 per cent are alcoholics.

That's eight million alcoholics, many of the "hidden" variety who do not realize or admit that they are addicted to alcohol. The Mayo researchers believe hospitals would welcome a test that identifies these alcoholics without tying up physicians with lengthy interviews.

"We think this test can be very practical for hospital use," Dr. Swenson said. "Ofentimes in busy medical practices, the physicians don't have time to ask the hundreds of questions necessary to determine habits the patients have.

"We've put straightforward statements in the questionnaire that the patient can respond to, and the physician can look at the results.

"This isn't a test that can be read in a newspaper by somebody who then says: 'My wife must be an alcoholic.' But in the hands of competent people, we think this test puts into objective, numeric fashion the things physicians might clinically know if they had the time to interview patients about their social problems.

"There is a place for a test like this in routine medical examinations." Swenson and Morse's test is an adaptation of the 25-statement Michigan Alcoholism Screening Test used by physicians and counselors in formal interview situations.

The researchers original trials were on 100 patients admitted to the clinic's

alcoholism unit. Of the 70 men and 30 women, all except one had been diagnosed as alcoholic. The mean score for the group was about 17 when rated by the patients themselves, 18 when rated by spouses and 22 when rated by alcoholic counselors.

Swenson and Morse decided that a score of 10 or more in the "alcoholic" direction would indicate probable alcoholism, and a score of 7 or 8 would suggest the strong possibility of alcoholism.

Then the test was taken by a control group consisting of 100 randomly selected patients, 31 men and 69 women, who were psychiatric or general medical patients who had not indicated they had an alcohol problem. They represent the type for whom the test would be used.

Using their scoring system, Swenson and Morse identified nine of the randomly selected patients as having significant alcohol problems. When they checked the medical histories of the nine, they found that six had "significant recorded alcohol histories."

The test now has been given to about 500 patients and it appears to be an effective screening device, Morse said.

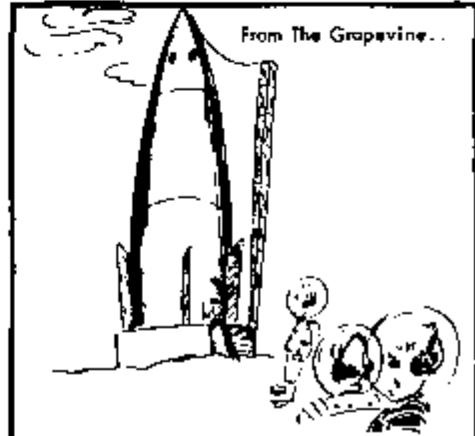

AUTHOR OF HISTORIC ARTICLE DIES

A non-alcoholic to whom thousands of us owe our lives died Sept. 19th in St. Petersburg, Fla. He was Jack Alexander, 73, author of the historic article about A.A. which appeared in the old Saturday Evening Post, March 1, 1941 (now available as an A.A. pamphlet.) He helped with the writing of "Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions," according to co-founder Bill W.

One of the owners of the Post knew some Philadelphia alcoholics in A.A. and a nonalcoholic physician there suggested as article on the Fellowship, then virtually unknown. Star reporter Alexander, formerly of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and the New York Daily News, got the assignment.

He arrived at the tiny old Vesey St. A.A. office in New York very cynical, having just completed a piece on racketeers. But he developed enormous rapport with A.A. members, eventually serving as a nonalcoholic trustee (1951 to 1956).

His article in the Post- then one of the world's most powerful magazines- had dramatic impact. In one year, membership swelled from 2,000 to 8,000, including most of the people-links in the chains of twelfth-stepping which led directly to most of us sober today.

His story also influenced our Traditions on self-support, public relations and anonymity, as you probably know from "A.A. Comes of Age."

25 TH ANNIVERSARY OF DR. BOB'S DEATH

Many A.A.s may want to mark in an appropriate fashion the 25th anniversary of the demise of Dr. Bob S., co-founder with Bill W. of Alcoholics Anonymous.

In 1935, Bill realized that to keep his own sobriety, he badly needed to talk with unsparing honesty to another alcoholic about his own drinking problem. Dr. Bob, an Akron, Ohio, surgeon was the first alcoholic to respond positively to that need. He died of cancer November 16, 1950, after 15 years of unbroken sobriety in A.A.

The way the first two A.A.s met and the results of that historic encounter are described in the book "A.A. Comes of Age". Virtually all of us find similarities to our own experience in the story of Dr. Bob and Bill.

Isn't that the way A.A. works? We don't just walk in and start doing the job. We have to be shown the tools, the 12 Steps. We have to be shown the instruction guide, the Big Book. And we have to be taught how to use these tools by the old timers on the program who have been using them for years, and many times, for me at least, a new man on the job will show me a way of using one of the tools that I had never thought of before.

Oh yes, some days are going to be better than others. Some days those tools are going to produce great results, other days, not so great. Once again, the tools have not changed, only my ability to use them.

The great thing is, there is a mastercraftsman. There is one who gave us those tools to begin with. When all else fails, I look to the mastercraftsman and say, "Ok God, I'm not doing so well, please show me again." When I can do that on a daily basis, I find it much easier to "earn my living". After all, isn't that what we are all looking for, the best living, sober, we can achieve, one day at a time.

WHAT IS THE CONFERENCE PLAN?

The conference plan is a method by which A.A.'s collective group conscience can speak forcefully and put its desires for worldwide services into effect. It is the structure that takes the place of government in A.A. and insures that the full voice of A.A. will be heard, whether it represents the great majority or a minority. The conference plan was established as a guarantee that our movement-wide services would continue to function under all conditions.

The Delegate's job is a demanding one. In so far as the conference is concerned, the Delegate has to attend the conference meeting in April prepared in order that he or she can vote intelligently. Every Delegate, immediately upon election, is put on the G.S.O. mailing list to receive all conference materials, requiring several hours of study. When he attends the conference meeting he brings to it the problems of his area. He considers the votes on all questions, not as a representative of a particular area but as a member of the conference whose duty it is to act in the best interests of A.A. as a whole.

A Delegate's expenses are covered in this way. The Mid-Southern California Area contributes \$200.00 toward the conference expenses. The group fund of the General Service Board pays the balance. An additional \$75.00 is given by the Mid-Southern California Area to cover incidental expenses encountered by the Delegate.

To insure the successful effectiveness of our conference, our area, and our society, we'll need the unity and support of all our members. Many of us can remember what "going it alone" was like. Support your GROUP, your INTER-GROUP, your INSTITUTIONAL COMMITTEE, and your GENERAL SERVICE.

Presentations and discussion on the Mini Conference, ways of reducing the number of Trustee Candidates for future General Service Conferences, adding

the rights of appeal and petition to our Conference Charter, and Guidelines for the Pacific Region Service Assembly will spark the Committeeman's meeting this month.

Literature sales indicate the membership in this area do lots of reading. There's a new pamphlet available, titled "The Last Talks of A.A.'s Co-Founders. You'll like this one.

The theme for the 1976 General Service Conference will be SPONSORSHIP-OUR PRIVILEGE AND RESPONSIBILITY. There will be presentations on 1) Sponsorship, 2) Alcoholics Anonymous World Service Literature, 3) Public Information.

After receiving several suggestions regarding A.A. Literature, it was approved that in the Literature presentation there would be two topics: a) the feasibility of the Big Book in paperback form; and b) discussion on the distribution of the Bill W. Biography. If you have any opinions or ideas on any of these subjects or any other topics, please forward them to your group G.S.R. or directly to me.

The Holiday issue of Box 459 in the Central Office Corner said this, Robert Thomsen, Author of 'Bill W.', biography of our Co-Founder, recently completed a cross-country tour arranged by his publisher. Every appearance he made generated phone calls to the local A.A. center.

At the October General Service Assembly, I was elected to serve as your Delegate for the next two years. It's difficult to describe my feelings at that time. "Stunned" I believe would be the best description, a little twig of apprehension, some doubt as to my capabilities. Some of the members offered encouragement, some I'm sure felt like I did. No doubt I'll make mistakes, say the wrong things, and not have all the right answers. What's more important is the ability to be able to admit the mistakes and know it's all right not to have all the answers.

We're fortunate in the Mid-Southern California Area to have the support, experience and strength of past, present and future committees. From them, we attain the courage to do the very best we can. Happy Holidays.

Northwest Portion (Phil M. of Laguna Beach): South Laguna, Laguna Beach.

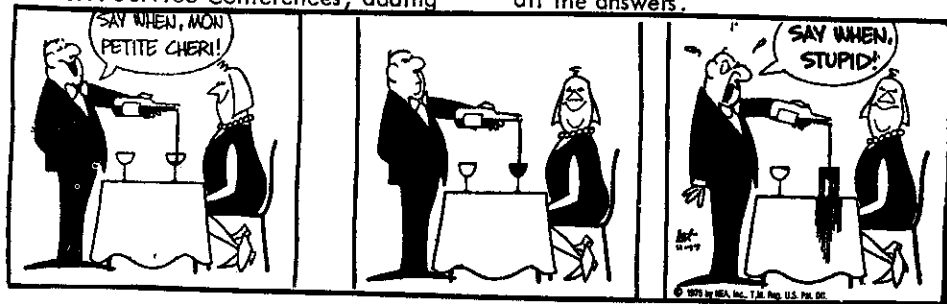

A score of 10 or more in the "alcoholic" direction would indicate probable alcoholism.

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) - The Mayo Clinic has developed a self-administered test for alcoholism.

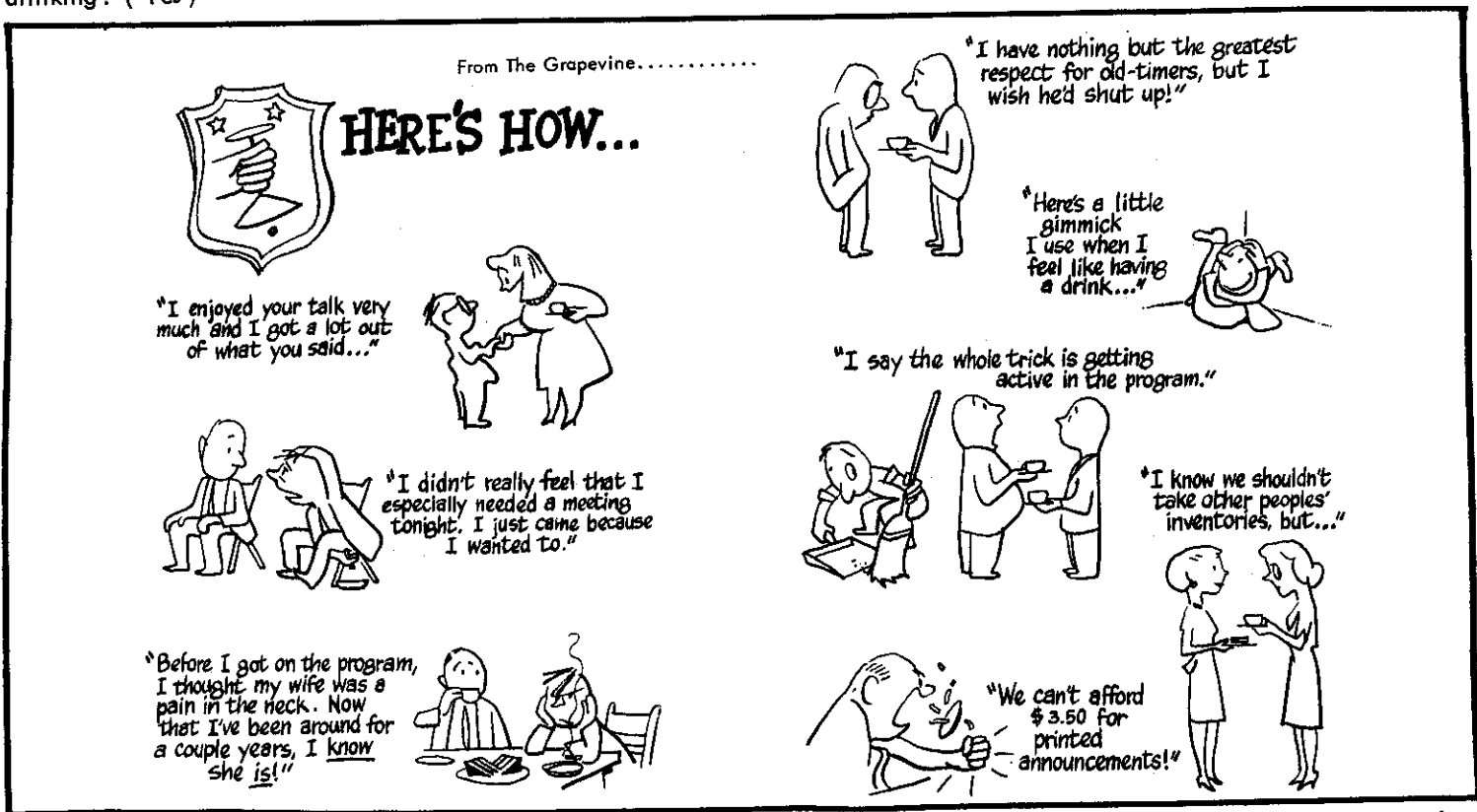
The clinic says results must be interpreted by a specialist to be meaningful, but a score of 10 is a strong indication of problems.

Here is the screening test (in parenthesis after each question is the alcoholic response. Score one point for every answer that matches the alcoholic response):

1. Do you enjoy a drink now and then? (Yes).
2. Do you feel you are a normal drinker, that is, drink no more than average?(No)
3. Have you ever awakened the morning after some drinking the night before and found you could not remember a part of the evening? (Yes).
4. Do close relatives ever worry or complain about your drinking? (Yes).
5. Can you stop drinking without a struggle after one or two drinks? (No)
6. Do you ever feel guilty about your drinking? (Yes)

7. Do friends or relatives think you are a normal drinker? (No).
8. Are you always able to stop drinking when you want to? (No).
9. Have you ever attended a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous because of your drinking? (Yes)
10. Have you ever gotten into physical fights when drinking? (Yes)
11. Has drinking ever created problems between you and your wife, husband, parent or near relative? (Yes)
12. Has your wife, husband or other family members ever gone to anyone for help about your drinking? (Yes)
13. Have you ever lost friendships because of your drinking? (Yes)
14. Have you ever gotten into trouble at work because of drinking? (Yes)
15. Have you ever lost a job because of drinking? (Yes)
16. Have you ever neglected your obligations, your family or your work for two or more days in a row because you were drinking? (Yes).
17. Do you ever drink in the morning? (Yes).
18. Have you ever felt the need to cut down on your drinking? (Yes)
19. Have there been times in your adult life when you have found it necessary to completely avoid alcohol? (Yes)
20. Have you ever been told you have liver trouble? Cirrhosis? (Yes).

21. Have you ever had delirium tremens (DTs)? (Yes)
 22. Have you ever had severe shaking, heard voices or seen things that weren't there after heavy drinking? (Yes)
 23. Have you ever gone to anyone for help about your drinking? (Yes)
 24. Have you ever been in a hospital because of your drinking? (Yes)
 25. Have you ever been told by a doctor to stop drinking? (Yes)
 26. Have you ever been apatient in a psychiatric hospital or on a psychiatric ward of a general hospital? (Yes)
 27. Was drinking part of the problem that resulted in that hospitalization? (Yes)
 28. Have you ever been a patient at a psychiatric or mental health clinic or gone to any doctor, social worker or clergyman for help with any emotional problem? (Yes)
 29. Have you ever been arrested, even for a few hours, because of drunken behavior(not driving)? (yes)
 30. Have you ever been arrested, even for a few hours, because of driving while intoxicated? How many times? (Yes)
 - 31-through-34. Have any of the following relatives ever had problems with alcohol? Parents. Brothers or sisters. Husband or wife. Children. (Yes)

UNDERSTANDING ALCOHOLISM

After centuries of regarding alcoholism as a moral weakness, medical opinion now holds that alcoholism is an illness which, like diabetes, can be arrested but not cured. Many clergymen now accept alcoholism as a sickness, not a sin. Continued research may discover the physiological as well as the psychological causes of compulsive drinking.

The alcoholic may be able to control his unwise drinking in its early stages, but it later becomes obsessive. Since the alcoholic is sick, nothing can be accomplished by reproaching him for lack of will power. It does not help to plead with him to stop damaging himself, his family or his business prospects. Nor should relatives of alcoholics blame themselves. They are not responsible.

They should realize, however, that their attitudes and actions can help or hinder recovery. Anger and resentment often provide an excuse for more drinking. Love and understanding are of the greatest help. But loving and understanding does not mean to be soft, permissive or protective. When we protect the alcoholic from the consequences of his drinking, it only makes it easy for him to refuse to face his drinking problem, and to recognize that he needs help.

Once the alcoholic comprehends the nature of his malady, there is hope for his recovery. The alcoholic must want to stop drinking before he can achieve sobriety. He must be willing to admit that he cannot cope with his problem by himself. He must want sobriety for himself and not to please anyone else. In Al-Anon we learn that he can be motivated to seek help. Much depends on the attitudes and actions of those closest to him.

Today, because of growing knowledge concerning the nature of his illness, the alcoholic often reaches mental or emotional "readiness" before too great damage has been done.

Wanting to be helpful, it is difficult for the partner of an alcoholic to refrain from nagging. A firm resolution not to protect him from the consequences of his drinking is a much more rational way to compel him to face his problem.

It is never too early and never too late for families to try to understand this complex, progressive illness, and to learn to understand their own reactions to the alcoholic.

"COURTS" HELP CARRY THE MESSAGE

Hi, my name is Sebastian and I am an alcoholic. Today I can say that-and be grateful- knowing the meaning and the consequences attached to that word.

I came to A.A. through the Court, on my last arrest on May 24, 1975, for my fourth 23102 on 12 years., two within the last 3 years. I was advised to attend 24 meetings for a period of 90 days, 2 meetings a week. That was the beginning of a new episode. I was not forced or sentenced to A.A. I was only advised, and I had that choice.

My first meeting took place on July 31, 1975, on a Thursday. After carefully studying the A.A. Directory I chose the Alano Club at 705 N. Harbor, Fullerton, because, since I reside in Buena Park, I looked for some place not too near, yet not too far.

On Thursdays is Twelve Steps reading and, at my first attendance there, I introduced myself to a most charming young lady, the acting secretary for that particular group, Edna V. Once I had explained to her the purpose of my visit, she welcomed me into the group, but cautioned me that since it was my first visit it might be a bit confusing for me but that I should stay and listen- which I did, and I am glad.

It took me about 2 more participation meetings to realize that I am an alcoholic, meaning that I have a progressive illness and that I will never be completely cured. As a result I cannot drink as long as I live, however, I must try to achieve sobriety, but only one day at a time.

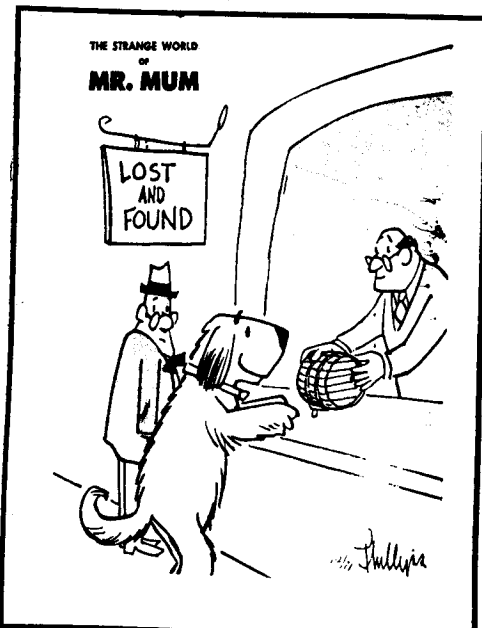
I took my last drink exactly 6 months and 12 days ago today, December 7th. When I came to A.A. I had been dry for 68 days, but I know that without this program, I would not have lasted another 30 days. I have learned a lot since that first day I have come to you wonderful people by listening to you as well as to different speakers, by participating in the discussions, by reading the Big Book, and by attending lots of meetings.

I feel a lot better already, though I have not fully recuperated, which I probably never will, but the main thing is that I am sober. Naturally, I still have some character defects, if not all of them but before I joined this program, I'm the guy who felt I had practically "none." However, by the Grace of God and with the help of all the people I have met in A.A. I get better every day, one day at a time. I am aware that I am now a life-long member of A.A., and I am happy to be one, because the only requirement I need to qualify is the desire to stop drinking.

I am truly appreciative that the Court sent me, that I found A.A. and that I found who I am, but above all, I am grateful to all the delightful people I have met in A.A. who have so graciously shown me the way to productive sobriety.
