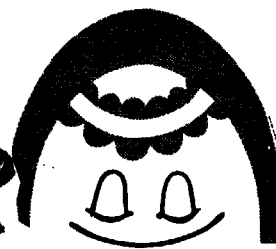
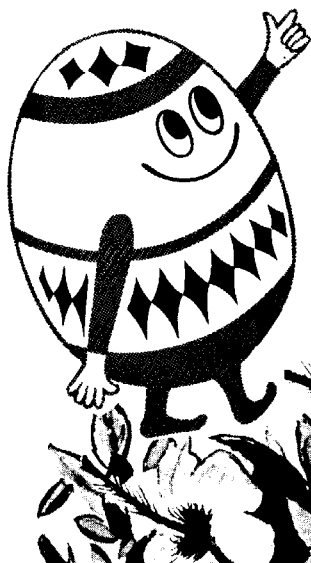

2,000 AA's Hear Bill In Chicago Address Early AA, Service Conference Theme of Talk

Older Members Extend Groups Third Legacy

Alcoholics Anonymous is more than a program of physical recovery from alcohol. It is a program of action. We should as individuals act on as well as believe in the 12 steps just as groups must act on as well as believe in the 12 traditions. The goal of all our endeavor is individual service, with the group functioning as an overall society or service. These were the highlights of a talk given in Chicago by Bill W., co-founder of AA, before approximately 2,000 members in Medinah Temple, Feb. 12, 1951. Extremely bad weather held down attendance but those who were there left the meeting with a resurgence a faith in themselves and a renewed zeal in the ideals of AA.

Talks to each of us.

Bill, as all who have heard him agree, is a speaker whose words reach out across the vast auditorium as though he were speaking to each of us individually. His hopes and aspirations become ours as he talks not to us, but with us. Tall, lanky, with a yankee twang, he spoke for more than two hours of early AA struggles, of the growth of the movement from adolescence into manhood, of the third legacy which he offered us in behalf of the older members, himself and Dr. Bob.

"For all of us," said Bill, "There came an hour of decision when we had to decide which way our lives were to go from then on. For all of us there came the realization of hopelessness, when we, as individuals had reached the end of the rope and turned to a source outside ourselves for help.

"Wives, too, had their hour of decision, whether to give up or continue with the hopeless sick one to whom they were married. The group had its hour of decision, when it had to decide the ultimate course that must be followed for the good of the group as a whole."

Bill drew heavily on his personal history a story heard before by many in the aud-

ience, but a story always new when he tells it, for it is that personal story from which sprang the movement as we know it.

Recalls trip to Akron

He told how, while drunk in a basement apartment in Brooklyn, a friend came to him, declined a drink, and told Bill there was a way out—God. He recalled his own agnostic scoffing, his later hope and his spiritual experience in Townes hospital in New York.

He told again of his subsequent trip to Akron, of the hopelessness of his business quest, of his meeting with Dr. Bob and of the raising of hope in Bob, or Smithy as Bill always called him. Bill chuckled as he recalled that Dr. Bob, sober a few days, called a hospital, told the head nurse that he and a fellow from New York had a new cure for alcoholism and asked for a drunk to work on: how the nurse replied tartly, "I hope Doctor you've tried it on yourself."

They found their first prospect in that hospital and sobered him up. And with three persons then sober came a realization they had a group. Not an AA group, for those three were nameless, floundering, with only an idea. But thereby was raised hope, hope that an idea might spread to other sick alcoholics, a hope that within a few months was to result in groups in Akron, Cleveland, New York City and elsewhere.

A New Realization

Then, three years later, came a new realization. With a hundred people in varying degrees of sobriety it suddenly dawned on these pioneers that the idea worked. They had something. But if they were to spread the word of what they had found they must have a book to recount their experience.

Those were the years of struggle. The idea that outside financial help might endanger the movement never occurred to them. Bill recounted this period, bringing many laughs as he told how one scheme after another failed— even to getting aid from John D. Rockefeller. But outside friends did help, more morally than financially, and the book—Alcoholics Anonymous— was finally launched.

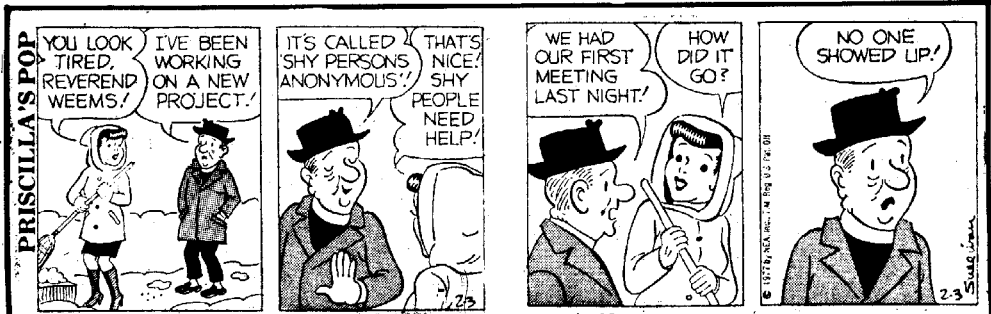
Then came the story by Jack Alexander in the Saturday Evening Post in 1941. Pleas for help and requests for information swamped the tiny cubicle of an office set up in New York and groups started to spring up everywhere.

This was a decisive turning point. A. A. moved out of its infancy and into adolescence.

The following nine years Bill described as our teen age period, during which we grew by leaps and bounds. In some years membership gained by as much as 50%. With growth came problems. Meetings moved out of the front parlor into halls. Service centers had to be set up to handle inquiries and take care of the problems of those within the organization. With this growth came the need for financial support beyond that of passing the hat.

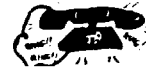
This period, too, saw the evolution of the 12 traditions as a correlary to the 12 steps— a guide to group conduct just as the 12 steps are a guide to individual conduct. These 12 traditions grew out of group successes, out of trials and troubles, bickerings, feuds, efforts of individuals to secure personal power and prestige, misguided contacts with the public, and a host of other problems.

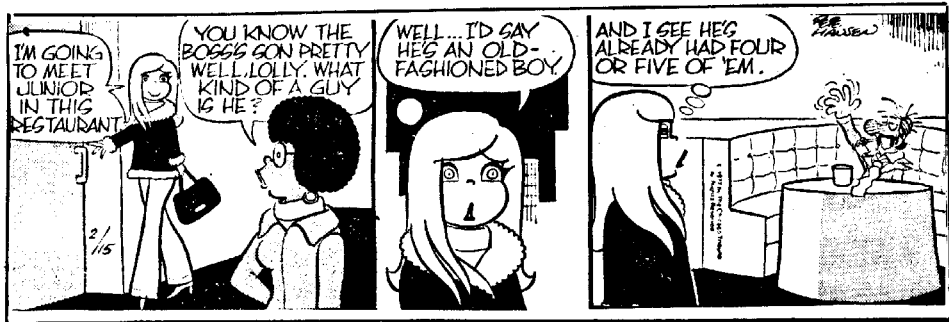

DEADLINE FOR MAY ISSUE-APR. 12TH!

Group contributions have always fallen short in supporting the General Service Office. The income from the books, pamphlets and Grapevine have always made up the difference.

Past Conferences gave approval for an increase in the cost of books and pamphlets but they did not increase the cost to the membership until 1975. Then in 1976 Conference Finance Committee recommended that there be a reduction in the cost of the Big Book and the price was reduced by 60¢. The bulk discounts for literature purchased by AA groups and offices liberalized and the distribution of free literature increased. This was all done in anticipation of increased group support through contributions. Without your support they cannot keep the cost of AA literature down.

It was suggested that we encourage a broader base of group support upon our return from the Conference. Frankly I did not quite know how to do this. As I have mentioned before "Let It Begin With Me", so since June of 1976 I have increased my contribution to my home group weekly.

Brand new people should be encouraged, as I was, when I was new, not to make a contribution. They always announce "New people please do not contribute." They do not seem to do this anymore.

The membership, a few years ago were interested in their group's financial affairs. Today it doesn't seem to be that way. My home group always had two people count the collections. There was a monthly reporting of the disbursements to the membership. This is only done by a few groups today. Most groups have only one person responsible for these decisions.

A number of years ago groups would count the number of members they had and multiply by \$3.00 and this would be the amount they would send to G.S.O. each year. This is not done too much anymore. We used to use small world banks with G.S.O. on them, this isn't done as much. Some members would send G.S.O. their \$3.00 each year. Some would send a dollar for every year that they were sober.

Even if there are plenty of other functions going on should we have special meetings where all the proceeds go to G.S.O.? The Harbor Area for many years have continued having their "Traditions Banquet", and all the proceeds go to G.S.O. yearly.

California has a membership of 62,000. The only state close to that is New York with 21,000. Yet California reports \$1.35 per member per year. We are the lowest contributor per capita in the United States. Maybe, because we are so far away from the General Service Office, yet Oregon and Washington each contribute \$3.70, so that couldn't be it. I thought it must be in the reported membership on the group cards that had to be wrong. Is there an unrealistic approach to prudent wealth and power throughout our fellowship? Is there funds in bank accounts far beyond the suggested amounts recommended?

There are meetings in clubs in the Mid-Southern California Area and the records indicate non-support to the fellowship financially as well as physical to the services, is at an all time high at these meetings.

How about the group conscience in your meeting or group, is it effective or totally non-existent? Is there a difference between an informed group conscience, an uninformed one? Do we really know the meaning of trusted servants, and their responsibilities? Do we really understand our three legacies, Recovery, Service and Unity? Do we really understand the difference between principals and personalities? Are the traditions when read at meetings to be endured rather than something to learn, understand and live by?

Maybe we should attempt to have a Regional Forum in this state, where members of the General Service Board and staff could come and report to you and describe the services and responsibilities of the G.S.O. and Staff.

I have written my thoughts and observations in this article, perhaps I've offended someone, this was not the purpose or intent. After the Conference this year I was encouraged to come back and broaden the base of group support so that our society could remain healthy and sound.

The cost of all the services to each member in our fellowship is \$12.16 per year. That is slightly over 4¢ a day. It is your responsibility if Tradition seven means anything to you, to see that they receive it.

They use to announce in all the meetings, "If you're new please do not contribute", I would like to make that announcement. If you're not new I would like to ask you to consider what I have said, and if you can, help to bring about a change that could affect our future.....Jerry F., Delegate

Problems Serve Purpose

But these same problems, so violent on the surface, served their purpose. For they gave the movement the answers to what is right and what is wrong. Finally in the late forties, these were set forth in the 12 steps of tradition. As this growth was going on a small overall group was functioning in New York— the Alcoholic Foundation—made up of alcoholics and non-alcoholics, the latter the outside friends of AA who have done much to help us steer a proper course. In the hands of the Foundation were entrusted the guardianship of the 12 steps and 12 traditions, the Works Publishing company which prints the Big Book and other AA literature. In their hands was placed our only official periodical— the Grapevine. There had to be someone to sign contracts, make decisions, handle the small national funds.

Foundation Little Known

These were the functions of the Foundation. But to most AA's the members were unknown. The only link between the foundation and the general membership was one composed of two men—Bill and Bob.

Two years ago, when Bill learned that Dr. Bob was incurably ill with cancer, he realized how fragile a link this was. And so, he and Bob evolved the plan of a general service conference. They reasoned that AA was then passing out of its adolescence or teen age period and was now coming of age. The hat-passing, parlor meeting days were gone; the joy of those early intimacies had to be given up for the overall good of the movement; that "government," negligible though it was, needed to be supplanted by a plan in which all of AA could have a voice. Thus evolved the plan for the general service conference. This scheme was to give voice to all sections of the country, with each state and province to be represented.

Pays Tribute To Chicago

Bill paid tribute to the Chicago group where the idea of a central service group was pioneered and where it has functioned smoothly since AA was started here nearly 12 years ago. The Chicago plan of operation, with its setup committee and

later its rotating committee and its central or downtown office, has had a profound affect on growth and unity of AA, he said.

The general service conference will function in somewhat the same way that the Chicago group functions. The biggest difference will be the scale of operations. While the conference will act in an advisory capacity only to the Foundation, it will provide a link into every part of this country and Canada and will establish a pattern for strengthening those links as we continue to grow.

This, Bill asserted, is vital to the continuation of AA, and must supplant the present fragile link, which since the death of Dr. Bob last November, rests only in himself.

"And I am highly perishable guy," he added.

"We are not big business," Bill said. "True we ship out three tons of literature every month from the New York headquarters. We handle the problems of 120,000 AA's in 30 countries. We answer thousands of inquiries yearly. Certain chores must be done for the group as a whole. To provide these service facilities requires an overall control, with no government and a maximum of service.

"Our movement, which has grown from that handful of nameless drunks of 15 years ago, to the Alcoholics Anonymous we know throughout the world, is now of age. Our services have gone far beyond those first simple ones of Annie, (Dr. Bob's wife, now dead) and Lois, (Bill's wife) who whipped up cake and coffee in the kitchen while a few of us in the parlor argued how we could dry up the world.

"We are now movement - a fellowship. On behalf of the older members Dr. Bob and I have bequeathed to you two legacies— the 12 steps for your personal conduct, and the 12 traditions for your group conduct. Now I bequeath to you in the same way your third legacy— the general service conference.

"We are slowly building our cathedral of AA life. On the broad floor supporting us all lay the 12 steps. In the 12 traditions we have seen the walls slowly rise. And now, in the general service conference we are adding the roof and the spire which we call 'service', rising into the heavens as a beacon light to the millions who still suffer, and pointing always to God."

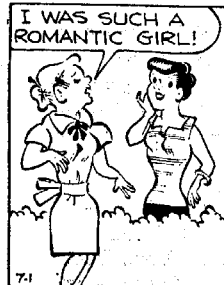

SHARING EXPERIENCE.....STRENGTH.....AND HOPE..

TWELVE THOUGHTS ON SPONSORSHIP

1. The relationship between sponsor and protégé is mutually rewarding. The sponsor is both teacher and pupil. You come to be so interested in your protégé that a hole in his shoes makes your feet cold.
2. You get a thrill when you see your new boy (or girl) making the grade. This thrill is heartwarming and lasting. You will never outlive the ability to be so thrilled.
3. Speak up to your own experience, but not beyond it. Do not tell someone else's story. Your own story, told simply without exaggeration or drama, carries conviction. It is the sincerity of the speaker that puts over our message, not the skilled oratory nor the well turned phrase. Only you can tell your story.
4. In 12th step work we carry the message to an alcoholic who is still suffering. We do not carry the alcoholic. Do not confuse 12th stepping with baby sitting.
5. When an infant is learning to walk, the wise mother does not insist on carrying the child. She allows the baby to learn to use its legs.
6. Encourage the prospect to speak. Learn to be silent in seven languages. What he says can be of great importance. In talking about himself he releases tension. The writer finds this most difficult. His friends who know him will understand why.
7. Do not think of yourself as changing your prospective new member. You are only the channel through which the Higher Power operates. Thomas A. Kempis said, "Be not angry that you cannot make others as you wish then to be since you cannot make yourself as you would wish to be."
8. Should your efforts be rewarded with success you, being human, will enjoy a great thrill, but always remember the credit belongs to the Higher Power. Remembrance of this will safeguard the sponsor against disaster in those cases where the prospect does not respond. Should we take the credit in successful cases we must blame ourselves when our efforts have apparently failed.
9. No honest effort in A.A. is ever wasted.
10. Responsibility of a sponsor. No man is an island. Always remember from now on you are an ambassador for A.A. Watch your behavior carefully. A slip on your part could cause the death of your protégé. Be especially careful IF dealing with a member of the opposite sex. Beware lest you cause scandal outside your group or about your group. Love is blind- but the rest of your group is not.
11. Do not let fear of making a mistake keep you from attempting a 12th step call. If any man can honestly tell you he has never made a mistake you can bet your bottom dollar that his father could not make the same claim.
12. Expect to be criticized! Ours is a Fellowship of men and women. Some of the criticism may be justified." It is better to hear the rebuke of the wise than for a man to listen to the singing of fools." Eccls., Chap.7, verse 5. Eamonn Andrews on T.V. recently quoted the late Pope John who in turn was quoting a much earlier Pope on criticism when he said, "Do your best and be happy and let the sparrows twitter."Tom T., Birmingham, England via Bristol
